After that we took out the kayaks to experience the marine life in the reserve for ourselves.

# MITO SCHOLARSHIP

Well done to Kaleb Carpenter, a past student who works at Poland Motors, who has received a Kick Start scholarship from Mito to help further his career.

The Kick Start Māori and Pasifika scholarships are awarded to individuals of Māori or Pasifika ethnicity who have full-time employment or an offer of fulltime employment in one of MITO's industries in 2019 and have not previously been enrolled in a MITO training programme at Level 4 or above. This



scholarship pays the first year fees for any MITO apprenticeship or traineeship programme at Level 4 or above.

#### POOR KNIGHTS - GEOGRAPHY

On the 12th of March, the Level 1 Geography class headed to the Poor Knights Islands to study the environment and the sustainability of the reserve. During our day we snorkelled,



kayaked, paddle boarded and cruised around the islands on the Perfect Day Cruise. We got to see the unique sub-tropical environment of the Poor Knights and the colourful marine flora, fish and stingrays. It was an awesome experience, which we recommend to everyone because you get to see the beautiful environment and learn about the marine reserve and sustainability.



#### LEVEL 3 HISTORY TRIP

On 1 April the Year 13 VC History class departed on their Northland History trip. The weather was terrible and changes to our itinerary needed to be made. On the way north we visited Ruapekapeka Pa to see how Maori built fortifications to repel musket and cannon fire during the Northern Wars. Despite the rain it was good to see the trenches and get an idea of why it was built in that location. We then drove on to Kerikeri to visit the Stone Store, which is New Zealand's oldest commercial building and also Kemp House, which was built by missionaries along the waterfront.

The next morning we visited the Waitangi Treaty Grounds where we experienced the history of the Treaty House. It was a memorable visit with the students getting to take part in many Maori traditional games in front of the flagstaff. Next stop was Russell. Some students were investigating the sacking of Kororareka so there were many landmarks for them to investigate.

They visited the famous flagpole, which Hone Heke cut down, and then went on to Pompallier House where we learned how the missionaries produced prayer books and leather.

On our third day we were lucky enough to get a private visit to

Butler Point whaling museum. Students are studying the early contact period and the information given was invaluable. As we were almost at the top we decided to visit Cape Reinga to see where Maori spirits depart to Hawaiiki.



Our last stop was
Marsden Cross at Oihi
in the Bay of Islands.
This was the site of the
first Christian sermon
in 1814. After climbing
up to the Pa site and
having a picnic lunch
we even managed to
find New Zealand's first
lemon trees. After all
this we made our way
home to Wellsford.

Students now have to put in the hard work completing their first history internal for the year. It was a great trip and was well worth all of the effort.

#### Hauora - Year 9

Thanks for all the wonderful support from parents and community again this term, we truly appreciate it.


