You provided us with a wonderful week of entertainment and demonstrated strong house spirit. SETTING UP KAMAR APP




The Process for setting up the Kamar App is the same on both Android and iPhone.

The Following steps are for the Kamar App and to log into the Rodney College Portal.


Step 1. Download the App

Open the App Store for your platform, search for Kamar and download the Kamar App. The App Icon will look similar to this.



Step 2. Opening the Kamar App for the First Time

Open the App and accept any warnings that may pop up about notifications. If this is the first time you have opened the Kamar App then you will be taken straight to the Settings page.



Step 3. Creating the Profile

To start creating the Profile click either the + icon (this might be different on an android phone, or the Default line.

Step 4 Adding the information

The first thing to do is Enter a name for the Profile.

It is best to enter your child's name

Enter the portal address next: https://portal.rodneycollege.school.nz Enter your username - childs first name and first 6 letters of the surname

Enter your password

You will be entering your students password that was in the portal letter.

Click Save.

Step 5 Logon


Once you click Save, you will be taken back to the settings screen. Here you can enter another child by clicking on the plus at the top right of the screen or click on the back arrow and you will be taken to the log in screen.

You can now click the Logon button and you will be logged in.





"AMNESIA" YEAR 11 DRAMA PRODUCTION



Directed by Lucy Duffield.

"Imagine a world in which everyone has become so reliant on computers that they no longer remember anything."

"Amnesia" is a thought-provoking play written by Angie Farrow, a contemporary New Zealand playwright. This ensemble production requires most characters to be on stage throughout the performance.

The Year 11 cast handled the challenges of this production with maturity and confidence, working together well to give the audience many interesting ideas to consider. Costumes were unique to each character, often giving us some hint as to their role in the group. One interesting concept was the use of a fake crown representing God, which was interchangeable between the characters.



The overall premise is that modern technology has destroyed our memories, resulting in people not even knowing the names of basic household items, let alone remembering previous emotional relationships or important concepts from their chosen profession. Thus we have an artist,

Sebastian who cannot remember the words he needs to describe his work; a psychoanalyst Heidi, who cannot remember a relationship with the artist Sebastian. Certain words seem to come randomly to some characters, but rarely the word they need.

This results in a great deal of humour and chaos as the characters continually search for things they don't remember, or in some cases don't even know what they are searching for; a case in point is the cuckoo-clock.

Towards the end there is a faint glimmer of hope as a few memories begin to re-surface, but in true 'Groundhog Day' style these are soon forgotten and the characters are doomed to repeat their confusing and futile lives.

This play makes the audience think about the effects of computers and modern technology on our lives – are we sacrificing ourselves, our minds and our relationships for the convenience of iphones, laptops and social media?

Perhaps this is why some of the top execs in Silicon Valley don't let their kids have a phone.


