All pick ups and drops off must be at the Tomas Road courts, not within the bus bay. Under NO circumstances are students to be picked up or dropped off at the driveway or in the office




picked up or dropped off at the top of the driveway or in the office area. The only exception is if you are collecting your child from the sick bay.




