

LEVEL 1 STREAM STUDY

In Term 1, Mr Trottier and Mr Kingsley's Level 1 Science classes went on a trip to do stream health testing on two rivers at Mahurangi and Goat Island.

We measured temperature, pH, macroinvertebrate, flow rate and titration, as well as looking at vegetation surrounding the rivers.





Our aim was to see what effect urbanisation and intense agriculture had on a freshwater ecosystem. As an added bonus, we also got to go snorkeling at Goat Island and saw a wide range of fish species and aquatic plants.


