BUS CHANGES

A few changes have been made to some bus runs to address delays and loadings. The numbers below refer to the new order in which buses depart the college).

1. Port Albert and 2. Topuni/Oruawharo: will now leave from the college **before** collecting primary school students, to avoid having to turn right onto SH1 in heavy traffic

- 4. Mangawhai Heads/Cove Rd: first drop off and pick up at Info Centre by Golf Course, running around to Cove Rd (same direction AM and PM)
- 5. Mangawhai Village/Moir Point: Drop off after Cames Rd, then through village, out to Seabreeze Rd and Moir Point Rd (reverse in PM, but same loop through Seabreeze Rd and Moir Point Rd)
- 6. School Rd / Cames Rd: Drop off and pick up between School Rd and Cames Rd



LIFE CHANGING OUTWARD BOUND

On January 5th I began my 2018 a little differently to anyone else at Rodney College. I was naively standing there at the Picton ferry terminal, with absolutely no idea what lay ahead in the next hour, let alone the next 21 days that I would spend at Outward Bound. The Outward Bound campus calls home a beautiful little bay called Anakiwa at the top of the South Island, a



place that holds a very large part of my heart. At OB the 146 students attending the 16-18 year old Mind, Body and Soul course were split into groups called 'Watches'. We were
