


MATARIKI WEEK

Moliere's
TARTUFFE
 (THE HYPOCRITE)

The Level 2/3 production went French this year with Moliere's Tartuffe, a rollicking classic French Farce. Though written in the 17 century the class used a modern translation and adaptation to great effect and set it in 1960's Paris. Religious frauds weren't anything new in 16c France nor in the 60's. Tartuffe, the con man, inveigles himself into Orgon's life and proceeds to turn his household upside down. It is a play where the women are wise and the men generally foolish. Everyone but Orgon and his harriden of a mother can see the hypocrite, Tartuffe, for what he is. Mayhem ensues!



The performance was littered with snappy dialogue, witty asides and much physical humour, particularly in the shenanigans of Tartuffe's attempts to seduce Orgon's wife and the purposeful entrances and exits and the scenes where characters hide to overhear what's going on.

The cast effectively and skillfully used the rhyming couplets, created the larger than life characters with great aplomb and wrung as much satirical humour out of the situation as possible. Everyone relished their time on stage and gave the audience a night to remember.
