throughout the year in preparation, only to have the plug pulled at the last minute.



#### Now is the time for our students to dig deep and do their very best.

Despite this extra time, it is essential that all Year 11-13 students use their time well over the term break to complete internal assessment work and to prepare for their external exams. Students need a **PLAN** and **PLACE** to work at home.

#### Organise your study place at home.

**Set up a Study Planner and stick to it.** A good planner should identify hours in a day, and days in a week. This should be reviewed on a weekly basis.

Plan your study to allow for the repetition of the same content and a focus on areas that need extra attention.

**Make big study tasks into small ones.** Break study tasks down into manageable, bite size pieces.

**Just do it!** Set a goal to do 20-30 mins of study, then use those distracting things you like to do (eat/listen to music) as a reward, before doing the next 20-30 mins block.

**Look after yourself.** Sleep well, exercise, eat correctly and remember to BREATHE.

### **BIOLOGY ZOO TRIP**

Our Level 3 Biology class recently visited the Auckland Zoo as an opportunity to further our knowledge around skeletal progression across human evolution. We attended a hands-on session authentic and discussing the evolution of hominins leading up to human existence. We were given the opportunity to analyse skulls and skeletons from different hominin groups. This was beneficial in order for us to interpret the advancement of their physical properties across significant time periods.



We took part in a group activity which included arranging also some model skulls in an order which best represented the time period they existed in. A critical observation across this activity was the

## LEVEL 3 TOURISM SNOW PLANET SHEEP WORLD

Tourism in a Covid world is a very different beast and it was both sobering and enlightening when Level 3 Tourism Students were finally able to go on our rescheduled trip to Snow Planet and Sheep World.

As well as experiencing what it was like to be a tourist at these two contrasting local

attractions, we had informative talks from key staff and learnt about the challenges and changes needed to successfully operate a tourist destination in 2020. We also learnt what it takes to be a great employee in these two iconic local attractions. One of the takeaways from visiting both venues was the need to be flexible.

For Sheep World, when 75% of their market disappeared overnight, this meant they needed to make changes to the product and the way staff operate to cater to a local market. We learnt that staff working at both venues need to be very versatile and able to work across a range of different roles while always maintaining high levels of customer service. Key attributes needed to be successful include being able to think on your feet, build and maintain client relationships, as well as being punctual and willing to constantly

learn new skills.

The trip complemented our unit on the Economic Importance of Tourism, highlighting the critical importance of domestic tourism both pre-covid and today. Many people are surprised to learn that domestic tourism always contributes more to the economy than international tourism, particularly in areas outside of central Auckland and Queenstown.

It was great to hear first hand perspectives from John and Brooke at Snow Planet and Karen and the team at Sheep World about how they are adapting and keeping our tourism industry going. Of course playing in the snow and feeding cute

animals also makes for a great day. Thanks also to Lara Callachan for coming with us.


