ROAD SAFETY AWARENESS PROGRAMME (RYDA)

The Year 12 Road Safety Awareness Programme was held on Tuesday 14 March at the Wellsford Community Centre. This year we sent our Year 12 students, rather than our Year 11 students, based on the fact that in Year 12 most students are either going for their licence or are on their learners or restricted.

RYDA delivers six interactive sessions aimed at exploring crucial aspects of travelling safely, combining the efforts of local road safety experts, including driving instructors, the Police and recovering survivors of road crashes. In one session (Stopping Distances), students were given the opportunity to be a passenger of a vehicle driven by a RYDA instructor, the aim of the session was to give students the opportunity to see and feel the distance it takes to stop a vehicle at different speeds.

The overall aim of the programme is to help our young drivers be safe on our roads, which also includes responsibilities as a passenger or a driver carrying peers.

We believe the programme has provided the students with valuable information that will help them make responsible choices in the future.

LEVEL 3 HISTORY

On 14 March 2017, our Level 3 VC History class had an amazing three day historical experience. To begin this adventure, we made a stop at the Ruapekapeka Pa where the final battle of the Northern Wars took place. We then went to the Rangihoua Heritage Park to educate ourselves on



the place where the missionaries first arrived in New Zealand. We found ourselves, that night, in a backpackers in Paihia with an amazing view of the waterfront.

The next day included many more exciting activities, such as a guided tour which helped us to travel back in time to the 1830s at the famous Stone Store and the home of the Kendalls. The highlight of the day was our trip to Waitangi Treaty Grounds where we visited the new museum and were very engaged with the historical content there which would be used as primary or secondary resources for our internal. We then walked further up to Hobson's family home and observed the three significant flags to New Zealand, flying there. From this, we caught the ferry across the bay to Kororareka/Russell to look at the historical features there, such as the flag pole that Hone Heke cut down four different times and the grave site of famous Maori chief Tamati Waka Nene. Our tour through Pompallier Mission station completed the day. On the final day we made our way up to the Hokianga where Mrs Callachan became confused between geography

and history, therefore taking us for a walk around the famous Wairere Boulders. To conclude our trip we went to visit the Manganunu mission station which had a beautiful view of the Hokianaga harbour, where we had our final tour presentation which was exciting. This outing left us with many memories and historical information that will be extremely useful for our internal/externals and later on, as now we know the history of our land and how the two cultures came together.

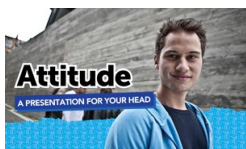
Year 10 - Hardwired

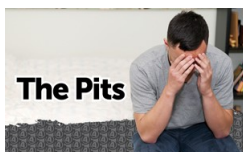
Year 12 - Sex with Attitude

Year 13 - The Pits

Mental health. This is a basic overview of how the brain works and a survival kit for handling stress, depression and the tough times in life. This presentation aims to normalise common mental health issues and give practical solutions of how to get help.

Topics they participated in included: healthy and unhealthy relationships, types of abuse, control in relationships, myths that perpetuate sexual violence and scenarios around consent. We were fortunate to have an amazing facilitation team including Senior Constable Sharon Glen, Senior Constable Bernie Watt, Senior Constable John Williams, Mel, Isaac and Lydia from Springboard, Anna Kingi and Rikha Paikea who were part of our Year 13 camp earlier this year and teachers Mr Tee, Ms Landrey and Ms Harris. John was able to share a number of "police stories" at lunchtime for students who wanted. The facilitators were impressed with the contribution from the students, and how they conducted themselves throughout the day.



STAND UP

POSITIVE RELATIONSHIP PROGRAMME

On the 3-4 April our Year 10 girls attended Stand-up: A positive relationship programme, to support the development of strong communication skills that keep our young people safe and empowered.

The focus on the first day was based on the "Equality Wheel for Teens" where shared power, self confidence, personal growth, communications and non-threatening behaviour were discussed. Boundary issues and consent were also addressed. The second day featured Phil Thompson for protect Self Defence who not only reinforced the messages from the previous day but also gave some very effective responses to potentially dangerous situations.



The feedback from the students was positive and they were able to give examples of specific knowledge they had gained during the two days.

DROPPING OFF AND COLLECTING STUDENTS

ALL pick ups and drop offs must be at the Tomas Road courts, not within the bus bay.

Under **NO** circumstances are students to be picked up or dropped off at the top of the driveway or in the office area. The only exception is if you are collecting your child from the sick bay.



NCEA PAYMENTS (NZQA FEES)

Students must pay a standard annual fee of **\$76.70** to have their results recorded on their Record of Achievement and for the awarding of qualifications. The fee is collected by the school prior to **1st September each year**.

A fee of \$30 per subject will now be charged for entry into New Zealand Scholarship as the \$76.70 NCEA assessment fee no longer covers entry to any NZ Scholarship subject entered.

Financial Assistance is available for all NCEA and Scholarship payments as follows:

To be eligible for financial assistance the applicant (normally the parent or guardian of the candidate) must be the fee-payer and meet at least one of the following criteria:

Be receiving a **Work and Income** or **Study Link** benefit as your main source of income OR have a **Community Services Card (benefit based applications)**

Have a joint family income that would entitle the applicant to receive a **Community Services Card (income based applications)**

Be a fee-payer with **three or more children** who are candidates (**multiple candidate applications**) where the total fees to pay would otherwise be more than the \$200 multiple candidate maximum.

How much will I need to pay?

	I am eligible for Beneficiary or income- based assistance	I am not eligible for beneficiary or income-based assistance
I am paying for one child who is a candidate	\$20	Full fees (\$76.70 for NZQF and \$30 for each Scholarship subject)
I am paying for two or more children who are candidates	A maximum of \$30 per family	Where fees are payable for more than one candidate, a maximum of \$200 per fee-payer


